

## NOTES ON CONTRIBUTORS

**JANNEL N. ABOGADO, OP, D.Th.Sc.Pat.** (Istitutum Patristicum Augustinianum, Rome) is a professor of Patrology and Dogma at the Faculty of Sacred Theology of the University of Santo Tomas, Manila.
